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# A LETTER FROM OUR REV. RODNEY ROEHNER

## St. Matthew's Family,

As I mentioned in a recent teaching moment, 'Lent' is simply an old English word for 'Spring', in particular, the daily lengthening of sunlight as warmer temperatures and blossoms greet us following the winter cold. That should be enough to get most of us excited for its arrival, but there is, of course, an even deeper and more meaningful reason to greet the season of Lent with thankfulness. Of all times throughout the Church year, it is the one that offers an invitation, a welcome to draw closer to our Lord Jesus Christ.

During Lent, this is primarily done in two ways. First, we 'take on' new practices, such as reading Holy Scripture daily, saying Morning and Evening Prayer, volunteering, or helping someone you know could use your assistance. The desire behind these efforts shouldn't be to simply get through them during Lent so that we can quickly go back to our old way of doing things come Easter. Rather, may they take root in our souls, in our daily routines, so that they become a permanent part of our life and growth in Christ.

The other way of drawing closer to the Lord during Lent is to 'give up' those things that have an inordinate hold over us. This falls under the Lenten discipline called 'fasting', but it certainly concerns more than merely food and drink. So I ask you, my brothers and sisters in Christ, is there something that controls you more than you control it?

Are there things that hinder your relationship with Jesus rather than strengthen it? Once again, these efforts of fasting during Lent should take on a more permanent character in our lives beyond this season alone.

Lent is an opportune time to come home to the Lord, to draw closer to the one who sustains us, who gives us purpose, whose love for us is unquenchable. How can we draw closer to him? How can we help others do the same?

I pray that all of you will take hold of this Lenten season as a gift, an occasion for clearing away the clutter in our lives in order to see Jesus with renewed faith. Opportunities to do so in the coming weeks are plentiful at St. Matthew's, details of which can be found throughout our parish publications.

Finally, I invite those of you who are able, but have not yet returned to church since the pandemic began, to seize this season of Lent as an ideal time to do so, to be welcomed by your church family that loves and misses you. May God bless our efforts throughout this Lenten season, and may we rejoice with gladness in the Risen Lord come Easter morning!

## Life Long Learning Groups

From the Catechists: Welcome back to Sunday school! Classes for age 3 through Grade 5 will resume on March 6th. Masks are required for all children and staff. We hope your children will join us to worship God in prayer and song as we make our journey through Lent. Our preschoolers will hear presentations of the Parable of the Good Shepherd, the Parable of the Pearl of Great Price, the Tracing of the Paschal Candle and the Last Supper. Kindergarten through second graders will be learning about the events leading up to the death and resurrection of Jesus and the places where these events occurred. The children in grades three through five will once again bury the Alleluia Banner and will further their understanding of our Lord's entry into Jerusalem and the Last Supper. All of the children will practice songs and scripture for our joyous Liturgy of the Light service which will take place on the evening before Easter. In this special worship service we will celebrate Jesus as the Light of the world! We hope to see you there!

### From our Parish Treasurer

St. Matthew's is off to a good financial start in 2022! The total net income for the month of January was almost \$20K, with both Nursery School and Church operations making positive contributions. These events resulted in a corresponding increase in our Operating Cash. As compared to the budget, revenues less expenses for the Nursery School were effectively even, and for Church Operations we were about \$5K above budget. The investment markets went up and down during January which ended the month about 3% below last year, but our total Cash and Reserves are still more than \$1.1 million.

## From our Director of Music

The music ministry at St. Matthew's is a special one. A small, but fervent bunch, the choir at St. Matthew's likes to sing almost as much as they love hosting brunch parties. The members come from myriad walks of life; some are teachers, healthcare professionals, scientists. Some are college- trained musicians; others are hobbyists that took up music later in life. No matter their background, every one of the choir's members is committed to faith and service through this ministry and use the gifts God gave them to make a glorious and joyful noise.

The COVID-19 pandemic ushered in an era of uncertainty and uprooted our very way of life. What would worship look like in the future? Would we ever be able to sing again? These were just some of the questions that were being asked and at the time, no one knew the answer to them. Many people had to become experts quite literally overnight in streaming platforms like Zoom so that worship could continue online in some capacity. I remember the Holy Week Services and how they didn't feel the same as they did in years past, separated from the live music and worship that captured the magnificent story of Lent. Still, the ministries at St. Matthew's persisted. I remember Martha, Joe, and I would record services in the sanctuary every week. Keeping just close enough to sing and play in time with each other. I remember the choir recording their individual parts to hymns so that I could make a small video to play on the livestream. It was certainly far from perfect, but we truly did the best we could given circumstances. The work we did helped bring people comfort in unsettling times. (cont.)

## Who are the Companions of the Holy Cross?

My name is Treva McLaughlin, and I wish to share with you information regarding the Society of the Companions of the Holy Cross. I am a Companion who came to learn about the Society from Anne Murray, one time Deacon at St. Matthew's. The SCHC was founded in the late 1880s by contemplative Emily Malbone Morgan, recognized in the Episcopal Church's lectionary each February. As the story goes, Emily and her friend, Adelyn Howard began praying together each day. When other women began to join their group, a movement was born, founded on the aims that: its members pray daily in thanksgiving and intercession, seek to live lives of simplicity, and work toward social justice. These central tenets continue to serve as the foundation for the SCHC today, now a diverse group of more than 800 lay and clergy women. The Society is made up of mostly Episcopal women, but welcomes women from any church in communion with TEC, or any woman willing to accept and follow the Society's aims and vows. Today, the work of the SCHC continues in local chapters throughout the US. Upcoming programs for the Philadelphia Chapter include a Quiet Day in March, and an April 23rd program with Stephanie Spellers, Presiding Bishop Curry's Canon for Evangelism, Reconciliation and Creation. ## Update from the Little Pantry

Jessica McClard launched the grassroots Little Pantry movement in May 2016 in Fayetteville, AR. She planted the very first Little Free Pantry Pilot, a wooden box on a post that contained food, personal care products, and paper items that her community could access at any time, no questions asked. Jessica hoped her ministry would bring awareness to the issue of food insecurity in her community, by creating a space for caring individuals to meet the needs of those most in need. St. Matthew's is proud to continue the legacy of Jessica's ministry, having built and installed our own wooden pantry in November of 2021. Soon, word spread that the pantry was available to people who need a helping hand after labeling it on social media, and liaising with the Interfaith Hospitality Network. Now, over two months since we installed the pantry, we find ourselves having to restock the items at least 4 times a week. The need is very present in our community, so if you would like to donate, please place offerings in our Parish Kitchen cabinet marked "Little Pantry", or in a storage bin on the porch outside the front of St. Matthew's. ## BRIGHT HOPES

#### Anthony: Tell our readers a story about the first time you came to St. Matthew's. What attracted you to our parish?

**Jim:** I grew up in the Methodist Church. Jeanne grew up in the Episcopalian Church at St. Anne's Abington, which is considered a "high" Episcopal Church and therefore quite different from my own church upbringing. When we got married, we decided that we would meet somewhere in the middle. After moving to the Hatboro-Horsham area, we were looking at churches and went to St. Matthews. While it met that 'meet in the middle' goal, additionally, the Interfaith Housing program made a big impression on me. It just seemed like the kind of thing that a church should be doing.

**Toni:** I discovered St. Matt's after attending Father Dave's son's wedding, which was beautiful! I remember enjoying the community here, but I was attending another church at the time. After Alan and I moved to a home on Tennis Avenue, and in seeking a faith home for our kids to grow up in, we found that St. Matt's was the perfect fit for our family.

#### Anthony: Tell us about your ministry at St. Matthew's prior to joining the vestry. Any highlights to share?

**Jim:** A long time ago, I was the parish treasurer. I've also been an usher and a reader at services for several years now. Additionally, over the past few years, Jeanne and I have facilitated our **Tuesday Night Prayer and Share Group**. When our kids were involved with Sunday School and Youth Group, we chaperoned mission trips, and other youth activities

**Toni:** I'm in the military and was raised Catholic. During my first deployment, I was asked to serve as a Eucharistic Minister. After praying about that, I accepted the role, working under a Lieutenant Colonel who was an incredible mentor and who showed me the depth of the Christian message. Later at St. Matthew's, I began helping with children's and youth activities, particularly with Vacation Bible camp. I really enjoy teaching biblical messages to our children and building community for them and their families. I've also recently served on the Parish Search Committee.

#### Anthony: How might you use your unique talents and gifts as a member of the Vestry?

**Jim:** I recently retired, and [...] I don't want to sit around and clean the garage all day, (although goodness knows it needs it!). Having spent the last 14 years of my professional life doing accounting for nonprofits, I feel like I do have experience and knowledge to share this gift at St. Matthew's. I'm happy that I have the opportunity to do so.

**Toni:** I am a highly relational person, so I'm really hoping to connect again with our younger families whether in our parish or in the community at-large. I'd be interested to work a little more on promoting community-wide opportunities and events where we can all engage and be present together. I look forward to serving as that conduit.

#### Anthony: I wonder if you have one or two 'bright hopes' for the future of St. Matthew's that you might like to share?

Jim: Jeanne and I both served on the Parish Profile Committee. When we shared conversations with our parishioners, we asked them: "what do you like and what might you like to change about St. Matthews"? While some people wanted 'more of this,' and others requested 'more of that,' some people wanted nothing to change at all. In my experience this is normal, because human beings typically do not like change. Indeed, making positive changes is an art form – it is hard to do. So, I think the bright hope centers around the fact that we have a new priest with new ideas. Fr. Rodney has a great sense of which changes might be considered such that our parishioners might accept and embrace change. So, my great hope is that new and different things will be embraced at St. Matthew's.

**Toni:** I envision our church as being a place where we support not only individual spiritual journeys, but whole communities – [a place that enables us to] take up causes that make a huge impact as a collective. Surely, this work will enable our church's growth, and people will see that we're working outside of its walls. My bright hope for the future of St. Matthew's is that we might serve as a beacon of light throughout the socioeconomic, geographical, and engagement spectrums. Let's learn, grow, and meet people where they're at. I'm really looking forward to doing a lot more to support the health and vibrancy of our church.
